Open, transparent and accountable government

We believe that it is in the public interest to maintain the status quo. That being that complaints may be disclosed and published without penalty.

Based on our experienes we believe that open, honest and transparent government is not currently beign achieved.

We want to have confidence in the complaints processes including the CCC however at this time that confidence and trust is not guaranteed. In our experiences it would be very poor judgement to place any trust or confidence in government complaints processes including the CCC. We are open to having new and improved experiences in relation to open, transparent and accountable government with all levels of govt and the complaints prosesses with a view to not needing to rely on the complaints processes at all in the long run.

Freedom of speech

We believe in freedom of speech and the right to express ones concerns in anyway a person or group deems appropriate under all the circumstances.

Any party to a complaint, whistleblower or accused, should maintain the right to express their concern, reservation or co-operation as they see fit.

The complainant and the alleged perpetrator have the right to speak freely about the matter if they deem that is the appropriate course of action in all the circumstances. This is managed well in relation to other jurisdiction like for example police alleging certain offences or clarifying that an individual is assisting in an investigation. This is very normal practice and the CCC should be no different. The current arrangements, the status quo, is more that adequate under all the circumstances.

Reputation of alleged subject officers

We believe that the reputation of alleged subject officers is not the responsibility of the CCC. The responsibility of the CCC is to honour and uphold the public perception of the office not the officer. Alleged perpetrators would not be facing public scruting if they behaved appropriately in the first place. It is only through utmost frustration with "the system" that individuals resort to disclosing or publicising complaints. The public already know enough to have their suspicions and concerns or know enough to ignore it. Do not underestimate the publics ability to understand the context of the difference between an

allegation and charges or a conviction. This is normal in every day life with police and other matters so it is not difficult to keep the reporting or disclosure of complaints to the CCC in the relevant context.

Fair trial

As stated previously, in other jurisdicitons, fair trial is not impacted by disclosure. Infact, it is in the public interest to know, for example that a body has been found and that the relevant authority is acting. Lets not complicate that which already works in every day life. Fair trial is not effected by the public knowing that an allegation has been made or the details of that allegation. In fact it is in the public interest to have relevant information to feel confident that the relevant authority has been informed.

Effectiveness of the CCC

In our experience to date, the CCC is not effective especially on white collar crime in relation to local government. We look forward to our opinion being changed in time through accurate, credible and timely communication and responses. From a review of the CCC website and media statements it is obvious that the focus is not on white collar crime. This needs to change because there is definitely something very dodgy going on in local government. People are loosing their livlihoods, officers are frustrated with the verious dodgy systems they are forced to operate under and it is having a serious socio-economic impact on our communities. If the CCC were effective on white collar crime then there would be evidence of this acting as a deterent to others. From our observations this is simply not the case and it must change. Bikie gangs etc are low hanging fruit however we do not believe that is the root off the issue.
