2. An error on an invoice issued by Ms Cork in 2020–21 resulted in a sessional fee for two sessions being remunerated at \$510 per session. The resulting \$20 underpayment will be corrected in 2021–22.

3. Mr Mullins presided over 12 hearings in in 2020–21. Sessions relating to 3 hearings were invoiced and paid in 2020–21 as work relating to the remaining hearings was not finalised in 2020–21. These hearings will be invoiced in 2021–22.

4. In 2019–20 we reported that one matter heard by Mr Mullins in 2019–20 was not included in the fees received for that year. This matter heard was further work for a hearing which had been paid in 2019–20 and no additional sessional fee was required for the second hearing.
